


## Samples of card printing








Card printing is a simple and economical method of printing. It can be done with all recycled materials like different types of cardboard. Very young children can enjoy card printing as they would be able to produce a cardboard block or cardboard collage by tearing and gluing soft card like Manilla card on a cardboard base. By the time children learn how to use scissors, they will be able to cut and glue more intricate shapes to create a narrative/story.

## Art materials

Light card like Manilla card, or card stock (old greeting cards)

- Classroom glue
- Scissors according to the age group
- A4 copy paper or Cartridge paper, about 4 pieces per student
- Paint, Tempera, 1 or two colours to print.
  Black and dark blue are best for beginners
- Old newspapers to cover tables
- Old rags for cleaning fingers
- 2 sets of 2 each, food foam trays, like fish and chips trays.
- one sponge roller per colour



## Preparation

Prepare your room or station by covering tables with news paper or plastic table cloth. Cut soft card of an A5 size enough to give each student 1 or 2 pieces to cut or tear shapes from.

Cut a different card about the same size to be the base, one per student.



Draw, cut and glue big shapes to create the printing block. Let it dry over night.
